### Alexandria Seaport Foundation

The Alexandria Seaport Foundation (ASF) is a volunteer-based organization working to preserve, develop and promote the maritime heritage of the Potomac River for the benefit of the local community, especially by involving and educating youth. The Foundation offers field experiences on land or on the Potomac or Anacostia Rivers, in rowboats or a 42-foot Dory Boat. Field lessons cover water chemistry testing, macroinvertebrate sampling, identifying and sampling wetland plants, and fish and wildlife. The educational program aims to provide meaningful, hands-on experiences for students to gain a better understanding and appreciation for the Potomac River and it's watershed. ASF has constructed a greenhouse at TC Williams High School where students can learn plant propagation skills and techniques. Plants can be used for classroom experiments and study of cellular structure and function.

- \* Lake Cook and Dory Boat trips are accessible to people with special needs.

The Alliance to Save Energy is a coalition of business, government, environmental, and consumer leaders who promote the efficient and clean use of energy worldwide to benefit consumers, the environment, the economy, and national security.

The Alliance's Green Schools Program works to reduce schools' energy costs in schools; educate students, their families and communities about energy and the link between efficiency, the environment, and finances; and engage youth in energy efficiency through hands-on, project-based learning. The Program engages several schools within a district. Using energy efficiency as an integrating theme, teachers are given the resources to use service-learning to engage their students in real-world situations in science, math, writing, and social studies. Is gender specific which allows teens to discuss issues that relate specifically to males or females and to express their own feelings and experiences in an accepting environment.

Incorporates life management skills to help teens deal with stress,

decisionmaking and peer and family relationships.

Meets the CDC Guidelines for School Health Programs to Prevent Tobacco
Use and Addiction.

Offers 10 sessions and 4 optional booster sessions through voluntary

participation.

Is conducted during school to encourage participation by students who want to quit.

\* Toxic Soup is a program that gives kids a better understanding of the harmful chemicals that are found in tobacco products. Kids are given a list of chemical

ingredients found in tobacco products and then shown dangerous household products that contain the same ingredients and that have warning labels on the

containers highlighting the dangers of the chemical ingredients. The point is made that, although the same chemical ingredient is found in tobacco, no warning label is given on the tobacco products.

\* Our annual air quality assessment, State of the Air, provides the foundation for these programs presenting the public with easy-to-understand information.

### Capital Area Food Bank

The Capital Area Food Bank works to feed the hungry of the Washington metropolitan area by acquiring nutritious food and distributing it through more than 780 nonprofit community agencies. The Food Bank also supports these agencies with education and advocacy programs, and strongly emphasizes empowerment and community development. In 2001, the Capital Area Food Bank distributed over 20 million pounds of food to approximately 250,000 area residents.

Together with the Chesapeake Bay Foundation, the Food Bank manages From the Ground Up (FGU), a community farm in Upper Marlboro, Maryland, that provides access to fresh produce, preferably organic, at affordable prices to low-income people. FGU helps people help themselves and the environment by giving them the opportunity to grow produce to eat and to sell in their communities. FGU's educational programs emphasize the relationship between agriculture and social justice.

The Food Bank also participates in Kids Café, a national after-school and summer meal program that provides balanced, hearty snacks and dinners to children, ages 5 to 18, at risk of hunger in Washington DC, Northern Virginia, and Prince George's and Montgomery Counties. Kids Cafe emphasizes parental involvement and educates the public about the perils of childhood hunger and attainable solutions.

The Earth Conservation Corps (ECC) works to reclaim two of the country's most threatened resources: the environment and disadvantaged young people. Its Eagle Corps service learning program focuses on the links between urban social issues and environmental issues as it helps young adults, ages 18 to 25, become successful participants in society as they complete important conservation projects. The Eagle Corps program is a member of the national Americorps network.

The Corps' Henson Center provides hands-on education programs focused on environmental, social and economic restoration of the Anacostia River ecosystem and surrounding communities.

The Center also provides innovative educational programming, curriculum development, outreach to local schools, and the use of specially equipped boats as 'floating classrooms' on the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers. This program produced the highly acclaimed film Endangered Species about the experiences and fates of ECC members working to restore the Bald Eagle to the Anacostia watershed.

The Corps' Raptor Center provides ECC members with job training in wildlife management and rehabilitation as they care for injured hawks, falcons, owls, and eagles before returning them back to the wild. The Corps' native fish hatchery, run in partnership with the D.C. Division of Fisheries & Wildlife, provides education and job training to ECC members as they work to restore indigenous shad and herring to the Anacostia and Potomac Rivers.
